



Explore Butte County Highlights Healing Remembrances & Impressive Progress to Mark Two Year Anniversary of Camp Fire

Paradise Town Council Adopts Bright & Hopeful Daffodil as Official Flower

BUTTE COUNTY, Calif. (November 6, 2020) – Two years ago on November 8, 2018, the Camp Fire devastated the Paradise Ridge community and remains one of the deadliest and most destructive wildfires in California’s history. However, a region filled with amazingly resilient residents, dedicated business owners and a caring community have found ways to regroup, rebuild and reconnect to share expressions of joy through the arts and various activations happening this month. As a fitting highlight, the Paradise Town Council recently – and unanimously – agreed to adopt the daffodil as the Official Town Flower, which represents a bright and hopeful future.

“Over the course of the last two years, the Ridge community has worked tirelessly to recover from the wildfire and move toward rebuilding the community they call home,” said Carolyn Denero, Explore Butte County Executive Director. “By a sheer sense of collaborative will and perseverance, this entire community is demonstrating strong signs of rebirth and renewal. Especially during this time of reflection, we welcome interested individuals to take time to experience some of the joy that has replaced the struggle and devastation.”

A number of uplifting two-year anniversary activations are planned for early November, a sampling of which follows:

- **Paradise Revival Festival (Saturday, November 7 & Sunday, November 8)**
This uplifting and free online festival (taking place via Zoom) connects the members of the Ridge community with individuals and organizations from fire and disaster-affected communities to engage with regenerative community work. The purpose of the organizing group, Regenerating Paradise, is to help the community increase their capability to regenerate Ridge communities with greater harmony and diversity of people, place, and nature.

- **Ridge Wellness Project (Sunday, November 8)**
Local artist Jessie Mercer, who created the ‘Ridge Key Phoenix’, has constructed a large, artistic wishing well so those affected by the Camp Fire (in any way) can add a letter or drawing of hope, resiliency and truth that they would like to share. Individuals can participate in the drive-thru event at the Paradise Community Park. In conjunction with the event, the Town of Paradise will distribute daffodil bulbs to those in attendance.

Butte County, 75 miles north of Sacramento, offers a variety of recreation, authentic local culture, and events within California’s North State. Named after the Sutter Buttes, Butte County was the northernmost gateway of the California Gold Rush and includes land from one of the original Mexican Land Grants.
